The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra begins its 36th season this fall on September 27. Our music director, Dr. Howard Hsu, has an exciting year planned, with something for everyone. As our nation prepares for its 250th birthday on July 4, 2026, each VSO concert will include music that reflects American traditions. In addition to our five regular season concerts, we have added a special orchestra performance celebrating our Independence, on Friday, July 3, 2026 in Unity Park, downtown Valdosta. It's going to be a great season.

The VSO positively impacts our region by bringing excellent orchestral music to the Valdosta community and works hand in hand with the Valdosta State University to serve its academic mission by bringing a high standard of performance to the stage. Additionally, the VSO has music outreach programs to further promote exposure to symphonic music. The VSO hosts Youth Concerts to introduce hundreds of local and area high school students to symphonic music. The VSO also helps provide musical instruments for the South Georgia String Project, allowing children and young people, who cannot afford to purchase their own instruments, the opportunity to learn and play. The Tunes for Tots, Wisenbaker, and LARC concerts bring joyful musical experiences to children and people with special needs. These and other music education programs are part of the VSO's efforts to help enrich the cultural life of Valdosta and South Georgia/North Florida.

Dear Friends,

As I write this I am still fondly remembering the VSO's previous season. Time flies by so quickly! We are already planning more incredible experiences that we can't wait to share with you this season.

Here are a few highlights:

After unsuccessfully trying to schedule a concert with Van Cliburn Piano Competition medalist Joyce Yang for last five years, we finally have her coming to perform Jonathan Leshnoff's Rhapsody on *America* in honor of America's 250th anniversary.

□ Peter Steiner (former Principal Trombone of the Vienna Philharmonic) and pianist Constanze Hochwartner are the soloists for Kevin Day's *DEPARTURES*. This might appear to be an unlikely instrumental duo, but you will be amazed by what the trombone and piano can do.

Dvořák's "New World" Symphony is regularly ranked near the top of "Favorite Symphony" surveys. The symphony is full of enchanting melodies (including the haunting melody that was later arranged as "Goin' Home") and pulse-pounding rhythms inspired by folk music, so it's easy to see why. Dvořák composed it when he worked in the U.S., so it's truly "Made in America."



VSO Principal Flute Sarah Jane Young makes her VSO solo debut on Lowell Liebermann's Flute Concerto No.
 She has already demonstrated excellence in her first season as our Principal Flute, so I can't wait for her to take center stage where everyone can hear what incredible musicians we have in the VSO.

□ Soprano Maria Valdes, a Marietta native who has sung with San Francisco Opera, Houston Grand Opera, and Atlanta Opera, makes her VSO debut as soloist to perform Barber's *Knoxville: Summer of 1915.* You will be transported to an idealized summer evening as described by a child. Valdes will also perform several of Copland's *Old American Songs* including the charming Shaker song "Simple Gifts," which has entered popular culture through its use in movies and the media.

□ Mezzo soprano Lynnette Chambers and tenor Samuel Cook will join VSU faculty members Susan Boddie (soprano) and Bradley Sowell (baritone) as soloists for Handel's *Messiah*. Christmas season performances of Handel's monumental oratorio have become a beloved American tradition. I am looking forward to seeing my colleague Clell Wright lead the combined forces of the VSO and multiple VSU choral ensembles in what promises to be a stirring concert, especially when the beloved "Hallelujah" chorus rings through Whitehead Auditorium. □ Bartók's Concerto for Orchestra was also "Made in America." After emigrating to America to escape the rise of the Nazis in World War II Europe, Bartók was poor, discouraged, and hospitalized with an illness when he was commissioned to compose a new work. He wrote the Concerto for Orchestra, which became a modern classic due to its rousing ability to showcase every section of the orchestra. Hearing this work performed "live" in a concert hall is an exhilarating season-closing experience that you won't want to miss.

□ The VSO will perform a free outdoor summer concert at Unity Park – my first outdoor concert with the VSO!

- The Liebermann Flute Concerto was originally commissioned by legendary flutist Sir James Galway, and remains a favorite as a showcase for flute virtuosity

- Bartók received the commission to compose the Concerto for Orchestra after he and his wife had left Europe for America during World War II
- * Bartók was one of the pioneers of Ethnomusicology. He and composer Zoltán Kodály traveled the Hungarian countryside, visiting numerous groups of people and recording performances of their folk songs on the phonograph. These recordings can still be heard today on Youtube
- The folk music Bartók collected greatly influenced his own music, utilizing elements such as irregular patterns and rhythms, and exotic scales
- * Joyce Yang was 19 when she won the silver medal at the Van Cliburn Piano Competition
 - [Joyce Yang's] attention to detail and clarity is as impressive as her agility, balance and velocity.
